13:30 CONVERSATION: WHAT IS THE FUTURE OF LUXURY?

As well as the centralized exploitation of resources, moving wealth from colony to metropole, the colonial model also propagates hierarchical systems of knowledge and taste; defining which objects are to be regarded as valuable and luxurious. In addressing fashion's contribution to the climate urgency, not only does the supply side, of global labour exploitation, environmentally destructive textiles, and designer education need to be changed but also the colonially structured desire for luxury in each of us. This conversation will explore what a truly decolonialized luxury fashion would look like.
